1. Her Activities as they relate to church and her husband's work.

She married Rev. L.L. Berry of Virginia Conference A.M.E. Church in 1900. She worked with him in small mission churches for 8 years. During the next 25 years she worked with him in the pastorates of many churches including some of the larger metropolitan churches. She was very active in most departments of the church, Sunday School and choir. Her greatest work was President of the Women's Local Missionary Society. She has served as Vice President, Assistant Secretary, member of the Executive Board of the Conference Branch for many years. She has been a delegate to the Quadrennial Conventions since 1919, at all times serving on important committees.

In the local Missionary Societies she organized committees to take care of the sick and needy of the church and community, Day nursery and to pay church obligations for the students in college and the widows and stranded people passing through. She was an alternate delegate to the 1956 General Conference of the A.M.E. Church in Miami representing the 15th Episcopal District. After the death of her husband in November, 1954 she came to make her home in Detroit, in January, 1955 and soon connected with the Abatenjwa League.

2. Her religious activities outside of her immediate parish.

Her husband's election as a General Officer of the his Church, Secretary—
Treasurer of Home and Foreign Missionary Society with headquarter in New York
City. encompassing North and South America, South and West Africa, the
Bermudas and West Indies for 213 years, opened greater the avenues, fuller
life and more responsibilities inher service to mankind. She served as hostess
to all the missionary ministers, their families and students comming to America
as delegates to General Conferences and to attend college and others who

became stranded in the U.S.

"Mother Berry". When two women missionaries passed away while in New York
it became her duty to care for them during their illness and burial. Her
philosophy of life, "Let me live in a house by the side of the road and be
the come bely some body as laws along Then my living will not be
a friend to man," has been exemplified in all her life.

In New York City she was a member of Mt. Zion A.M.E. Church, the local Missionary Society and Executive Board of the Conference Branch, a member of the Home Mission Conference and Foreign Mission Council of North America, now the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. Department of Home Missions and Foreign Missions. She served as a member of the Executives, Administrative, Personel and Migrant Committees of the Home Missions for many years and the Executive Committee of Foreign Missions, attending covnention s in various cities and Buck Hill Falls for several years. She attended the Constituting Convention of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. consisting of 29 communions whose theme was "This Nation Under God" once of the greatest conventions ever held in Christendom. While working with the Migrant Committee of the Home Missions Council she had the privilege of the joinning the Staff and other members of the Committee on a trip to a Migrant Camp at Riverhead, L.I. They traveled in the first station wagon called "The Harvester", purchased by the council, which was dedicated at this meeting. She was a member of the United Council of Church women and a voting delegate to all Biennial *** Assemblies untill 1955, a member of Nominating and Christian World Missions Committee of the Council and active as Chairman of Harlem Group of No. 1 World Day of Prayer which led the entire 20 areas in Manhattan.

She joined the Interdenominational Ministers Wives Association in 1933, the National in 1943. In the Local she held the office of President, Vice President and Treasurer. As President in 1942 and 1945 they entertained the soldiers and sailors at Christmas and giving pocket testaments instead of having their regular Christmas dinner. Under her administration a War Bond Drive was put

on at which time over \$35,000 worth of stamps and bonds were sold. She received a citation from the Government for outstanding work done. She is a member of The A.M.E. Minister Wives Association, The Woman's National Sabbath Alliance and has been a member of Oder Eastern Star for 47 years.

She was member of the 1897 class of Kittrell College and salutatorian of the class. The President of the college was the late Dr. Jno. R. Hawkins who was then Secretary of Education of the A.M.E. Church. She was a public school teacher in Person County, North Carolina for 8 years. She substituted and taught in private and night school at many places where her husband pastored. Monrovia College and Industrial Institute conferred upon her the degree of Humanities in 1955.

As a mother and Ministers wife , she reared six children and her orphaned youngest sister. Of the seven all have College education except one who has a hearing handicapped. All except one are married and have families. All seven are Active Adult Church Workers and have served as Trustee, Steward, S.S. teachers, Choir members, Youth Workers, General Conference delegates, Laymen's league workers in the A.M.E. Church.

In addition to church work, her offspring have been active participants in Fraternal and Civic affairs including The Alphi Phi Alpha and Omega Phi Psi Fraternities, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority. The Masons, Shriners and The Democratic Party.
