CONSULTATION BY APPOINTMENT

Dear Leonidas,

Three or four days ago Dr. Louise Young, a lady with a very pleasant voice, called me to request that I discuss a paper which you are to read to Baltimore's Monumental Medical Society on the late afternoon of February twenty-first. She said that you had suggested that I be a discussor---and that was good to know.

Fortunately, I didn't tear anything. Subsequent roentgen studies failed to show a good reason for my difficulty with the endoscopes.

I wish that I could hear your talk when you are in Baltimore and I'd like very much to discuss it. But I'll only have my seventieth birthday once, eh?

I hope to see you in Boston in May!
