


Everyday Miracles: Medical Imagery in Ex-Votos

Everyday Miracles

The expression of our relationship with illness is wonderfully illustrated in the exvoto, a small devotional painting that gives thanks to a saint or deity for a miraculous healing or blessing.



The faithful have always used prayer to invoke the aid of saints as a means to heal the sick and end one's suffering.

Usually painted on tin, ex-votos are created as a personal expression of thanks and a public testimony to faith and gratitude.

Ex-votos offer a rare opportunity to view health, healing, and illness through the eyes of the ordinary person.

The tradition, believed to have originated in Italy in the 15th century, continues to be practiced today.
