Charles R. Drew University of Medicine and Science proposed a program to enhance awareness of Health Equity by utilizing the Health Literacy and Environmental Health Resources made available by the National Library of Medicine (NLM), the National Institutes of Health (NIH), and Health and Human Services (HHS) with the aim to empower the community by furnishing them with valuable Health Information, ultimately contributing to the mitigation of existing health disparities. Drew University of Medicine and Science (CDU) and other community and civic organizations serving the South Los Angeles area.
