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PREMEDLINE for Early Data Delivery

In order to speed the flow of new information to NLM database searchers. NLM announces the arrival of a new database, PREMEDLINE, on August 13. 1996. This database provides basic citation information and abstracts before they are indexed and put into MEDLINE, and will be updated daily. NLM database searchers will have the opportunity to view citations while they are separately undergoing the process of being indexed for MEDLINE. Citations will remain in PREMEDLINE only until they have had MeSH terms, Publication Types, GenBank accession numbers, and other indexing data added. Once the indexing is finished, the complete records will be added to the weekly MEDLINE update, and the PREMEDLINE record will be deleted from the database.

The PREMEDLINE Unit Record is displayed in Figure 1 on page 4. The unit record can be retrieved online by entering SINFO PREMEDL at any USER: prompt. Initially, PREMEDLINE will be available only to command language searchers. It will eventually be added to the databases accessible through Internet Grateful Med and Grateful Med for Windows as their development schedules permit. PREMEDLINE searches will be billed at the same rate as searches in the MEDLINE database.

[In Process Citation]

Sample searches from the PREMEDLINE database follow in Figures 2 and 3 (pages 5-6). The rubric [In Process Citation] has been added to the end of every Title (TI)

field to identify the status of the citation. Because the file does not include MeSH headings, all subject searching is performed as text word matches against words in the title and abstract (if present). If you do not qualify your search term, the search default is to Text Word (TW) searching. Therefore, all multi-word phrases must be entered as single words ANDed together.

Searching non-English Language Citations

Some citations to foreign language journals will have only the rubric phrase [In Process Citation] in the TI field because the English-language title is created and added to the Title field during the indexing process. The lack of a title in the TI field means that if the article does not also have an English-language abstract then the citation cannot be retrieved with a Text Word search. Therefore, be aware that Text Word searching in this database may result in some non-English language citations not being retrieved.

PREMEDLINE and MEDLINE

The citations in PREMEDLINE are given permanent Unique Identifiers (UI) that carry over into MEDLINE. The DA (Date of Entry) field, however, is specific to each file. That is, it will not be the same in the two files, reflecting the different dates the record was entered into each database. Also, be aware that these citations have not gone through NLM's quality control process. Citations may include extraneous, erroneous or

missing characters in any field. Errors present in the record will be corrected during the indexing process and the corrected citation will appear in MEDLINE. No errata, commentary, retractions, or corrections will be added to PREMEDLINE. §

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Technical Notes

PDQ Passwords Are Being Discontinued

PDQ passwords will become obsolete later this year, and access to all MEDLARS databases and features will be permitted only with a MEDLARS (ELHILL) User ID and Password. PDQ searchers may begin using their MEDLARS passwords to access the database now. Grateful Med (GM) users and command language searchers should change the password in their GM PDQ setup or communications software automatic logon script to their MEDLARS password. However, users who ftp results of Auto SDI searches, or issue the \$DSPRINT command from the MEDLARS server must continue using the PDQ password until further notice. Command language searchers are also reminded that they can access PDQ from any USER: prompt in the MEDLARS system by typing the command, FILE PDQ.

HISTLINE Update

When the new MeSH-based HISTLINE was created in 1994 (see pages 1, 9-14 of the July-August 1994 *Technical Bulletin*), approximately 30,000 of the old HISTLINE records could not be transferred because they lacked MeSH headings. A three phase project to add MeSH headings to these citations and transfer these records into the current HISTLINE has been under way.

The first phase of this retrospective conversion has been to isolate citations from journals in the NLM collection that were not covered in any other NLM database, and to convert them into the current HISTLINE format. This phase has now been completed and 14,975 of the old records were added to the current HISTLINE on June 21, 1996.

The second and third phases of the conversion project, now in progress, entail the identification and conversion of journal articles from non-NLM sources, and analytics which include book chapters and papers from conferences and meetings.

The value of "HMDOLD" in the Secondary Source (SI) field identifies records that have been converted from the old HISTLINE and can be searched as follows:

USER: (SI) HMDOLD For subject searching of these older records, MeSH headings and Keywords may both be used. There are no abstracts available for any of these citations.

FEDRIP Subfile Unavailable in TOXLINE

The FEDRIP (Federal Research in Progress) subfile was removed from TOXLINE when the database was regenerated in May 1996. It is expected that FEDRIP will be put back into TOXLINE in the August update of the file. Watch the online NEWS for further notice.

TRI94 Available on TOXNET

On June 26, 1996, TRI94 joined TRI87-93 to become the eighth file in the EPA's Toxic Chemical Release Inventory (TRI) series, available on TOXNET. TRI data is collected by EPA from facilities around the country and includes estimated releases of certain chemicals to the environment (air, water, land, underground injection) as well as source reduction and recycling activities. The data available on TOXNET are the same as the public data release documents.

Thirty new chemicals are reportable for the first time in TRI94 and several chemicals have been removed from the list of chemicals reported. The 1994 reporting year was the first year of mandatory federal facility reporting to TRI. A new data element with the mnemonic, FEDA (Federal Agency), has been added which allows searching for Federal Government agencies by acronym, full name, or individual word in the name.

New Journal Titles Selected for Indexing

Due to the current backlog created by the data entry dispute, some journals selected for addition to *Index Medicus* (and MEDLINE) in 1996 will begin indexing with the 1997 issues unless the publisher can provide the citation and abstract electronically in SGML Tagged format. Usually, new titles begin indexing during the year in which they are selected and they appear in the Titles Selected for Indexing section of the Serials Update information. (The Serials Update is available online with the SINFO command and via anonymous ftp; see page 14 of the May-June 1996 *Technical Bulletin* for details.)

Appendix A contains a list of the journal titles that have been selected following the February and June 1996 meetings of the Literature Selection Technical Review Committee (LSTRC); titles with an asterisk (*) before their names will be indexed beginning with 1997 issues. Titles without an * will be indexed beginning with the 1996 issues later this year.

Medical Subject Headings, Annotated Alphabetic List, 1996 Errata

In the 1996 Medical Subject Headings, Annotated Alphabetic List certain tree numbers appear with a plus sign but in fact have no descriptors indented under the tree number. For example, in the entry for 'Anabolic Steroids' the tree number is displayed as 'D6.597.100.194+' but there are no narrower terms for the descriptor at this tree number.

This problem occurred because the NLM publications program that generates the plus sign used the MeSH Trees data from the 1995 MeSH rather than from the 1996 MeSH. Consequently, a tree location having indentations in the 1995 MeSH appears with a plus in the 1996 *Annotated Alphabetic List*, whether or not there are indentations for the tree number in 1996 MeSH.

The problem is most visible in descriptors that became Pharmacologic Action (PA) terms in 1996 MeSH. Many of these 314 PA terms no longer have narrower terms treed under them; instead, those once narrower terms now contain the PA term in the new PA data element in the online MeSH Vocabulary File. (Two lists of PA terms are displayed in the 1996 MeSH Tree Structures, beginning on p. I-154.)

The reverse discrepancy was also produced. If a tree number had no indentations in 1995 MeSH but had narrower terms added in 1996, there is no plus sign displayed in the *Annotated Alphabetic List*. See, for example, 'Alkylating Agents'.

The problem was fixed by the time the Alphabetic List for Index Medicus MeSH (Black & White MeSH) was produced so this version can be used to check the Annotated Alphabetic List. The MeSH Tree Structures publication may also be used to check the actual terms listed under a heading showing

the plus sign, because it is unaffected by the problem. Or you can use the ELHILL TREE command online to display the hierarchical listing for any term e.g., TREE ALKYLATING AGENTS.

The abstracts are searchable by author name, title words, and keywords. A keyword search looks for the word or words in the Title, Abstract, or Address field.

Online Registration is Now Available via Netscape 2.0 (or Higher)

Online registration became available on the Internet Grateful Med World-Wide Web site (http://igm.nlm.nih.gov) in June 1996. The current online registration system works only with Netscape 2.0 or higher; the earlier versions of Netscape do not have the encryption necessary to safeguard the transmission of credit card numbers. The Library is currently developing a comprehensive online registration system that will allow non-Netscape users access and will also have many additional features available.

The current system allows users with Netscape to register online and immediately receive a User ID code and password. All persons using the online registration system must supply their credit card number as part of the application process. Billing to a credit card is the only option; if you wish to choose direct payment or bill to a Deposit Account, then you cannot use the online registration system and must apply with a paper

application form. International users do not have the option of applying with a paper application form; they must use the online registration process and bill to a credit card. The new online registration is open to individuals and students from within the United States and also from outside the United States. Codes issued to persons within the United States may be used with a modem connection or with an Internet connection and they may be used with any version of Grateful Med or without a Grateful Med interface. Regular codes (that is, non-student codes) issued within the United States receive a \$20.00 search credit. Codes issued to persons outside the United States will require the use of Internet for access and will contain a surcharge on the basic billing rate. Students, both domestic and international, receive a discounted search rate for two years; however, a surcharge will apply to the international student rate.

International Access

Prospective international users are urged to consider contacting an International MEDLARS Center for assistance in establishing an account to search the NLM databases. Grateful Med training and user support services may also be obtained from the International Centers. (NLM regrets that it cannot provide international users such support directly.) The full list of International MEDLARS Centers addresses is shown in Appendix C of this issue. Proximity Searching in TOXNET

More than 10 years have elapsed since TOXNET's SAME command spearheaded NLM's efforts at implementing proximity searching. Over the years this command has proven its value in allowing for more precise searching and minimizing false drops. Nonetheless, it was recognized from the start that the SAME command would need to be improved before TOXNET could be said to offer full proximity searching capabilities. This improvement arrived recently in the form of two new operators, ADJ and NEAR, which now complement SAME. This article will review all three operators in the general context of proximity searching and show how they can result in more effective search strategies.

The "AND" Boolean Operator

In terms of online searching, proximity refers to the degree of spatial closeness between two or more search terms. Proximity searching involves techniques for specifying exactly how closely these terms should be spaced. It implies an AND Boolean operator and places a greater restriction upon it.

One could argue that the most elemental form of proximity operator is the AND command together with a specific data element. Thus, the HSDB search strategy -(HTOX) HEART AND ATTACK - in itself indicates that the words "heart" and "attack" should both appear in an HTOX field. There is proximity here in the sense that the system does not look for the words anywhere in the record, but specifically in the HTOX field. Among the many problems with not going beyond this approach is that a file, such as HSDB in particular, may contain many occurrences of a given field. Thus, although this approach will certainly retrieve chemical records where "heart attack" is listed, and in the context you want, there may be other instances where the retrieved records are actually false drops. False drops occur when you successfully retrieve what your search specifies, but the data are not really what you want. Thus, staying with the example, a record may be retrieved which speaks of "heart chambers" in one HTOX occurrence and "attack of white cells" in another. This probably has no bearing on heart attacks, but fulfills your search conditions.

The SAME Command

The SAME command takes proximity searching one step further by requiring TOXNET to look for terms ANDed together in the same data occurrence. Thus, entering SAME (HTOX) HEART AND ATTACK, would ensure that the words "heart" and "attack" both appear in the same HTOX data occurrence(s) of the retrieved records. This, of course, still does not guarantee that the phrase "heart attack" itself appeared, but it does increase the likelihood of it, relative to the aforementioned search without the SAME command.

ADJ and NEAR

The ADJ and NEAR operators go beyond the SAME command in allowing users to much more finely tune the nature and degree of closeness between search terms.

ADJ instructs TOXNET to search for terms right next to, or close to, one another, in the order specified. Thus, (HTOX) PULMONARY ADJ EMBOLISM looks for the exact phrase "pulmonary embolism" in HTOX field occurrences. A search such as

(HTOX) VISUAL ADJ5 DISTURBANCES, on the other hand, would look for the the words "visual" and "disturbances", in that order, separated by fewer than 5 words, in HTOX field occurrences. This could include "visual disturbances", of course, but it also could include "visual and mental disturbances." The @ symbol can be used instead of ADJ with or without a space on either side of the @

NEAR operates in a fashion very similar to ADJ, the difference being that the order of the terms does not matter. Thus, (HTOX) EXPIRATORY NEAR PEAK looks for either "expiratory peak" or "peak expiratory" in occurrences of fields within the HTOX category. The search (HTOX) WEIGHT NEAR2 LOSS would look for the words "weight" and "loss", separated from each other, in any order, by fewer than 2 words, in occurrences of fields within the HTOX category. This could include phrases such as "weight loss" or "loss of weight."

More on Proximity Operators

Nesting parentheses, truncation, and the ALL command cannot be used with the ADJ and NEAR operators, but can be used with the SAME operator. The table below shows correct and incorrect proximity designations.

RIGHT: (htox) liver near5 heart or kidney near5 heart
RIGHT: same (htox) (liver or kidney) and heart
WRONG: (htox) (liver or kidney) near5 heart

RIGHT: (enex) aquatic adj organism or aquatic adj organisms
RIGHT: same (enex) aquatic and all organism:
WRONG: (enex) aquatic adj organism:
WRONG: (enex) aquatic adj organism:

The SAME command generally gives a quicker response than a PROXIMITY operator and is less expensive to use.

Note in Figure 1 (below and on the next page) that the ADJ and NEAR operators may take a few minutes to give a response to your request.

ADJ and NEAR can be combined and used more than once in an individual search statement, and also be used within a SAME. Examples:

(htox) nervous adj system near5 central same (firp) fire near control and foam

Proximity searching in ELHILL defaults to the Title and Abstract fields and postqualification must be used if qualification is required. However, if you wish to qualify your TOXNET proximity search, you must use prequalification, e.g., (HTOX) skin adj contact.

More Proximity Examples Available Online

More examples of the use of these proximity operators may be found with the

use of the EXPLAIN command. While online, simply enter EXPLAIN PROXIMITY for a general overview, or EXPLAIN SAME, EXPLAIN ADJ, or EXPLAIN NEAR, for more specific descriptions. Also, the *TOXNET Reference Guide*, recently revised and dated June 1996 (see Technical Note on page 3 of this issue for order information), contains a full description of TOXNET's proximity search operators.

Choosing Between SAME and a Proximity Operator

With the advent of ADJ and NEAR, more thought needs to be given to when to use these operators versus when to use SAME. You should lean towards using SAME when there is no particular functional relationship

between the terms, such as when you are looking for effects of a chemical being studied on both cats and on dogs (e.g., SAME (NTOX) CATS AND DOGS). These are cases where you are looking for studies discussing several concepts, but where there is not necessarily a relationship between these concepts. On the other hand, where you are searching for a concept clearly represented by a phrase, such as "renal hypertension," you should try one of the more specific proximity operators (e.g., (HTOX) RENAL ADJ HYPERTENSION). Indeed, the earlier example of "heart attack," would better be searched not with the "same" command, but as (HTOX) HEART ADJ ATTACK.

Figure 2 illustrates the differences in the retrieval obtained using ADJ, NEAR and SAME commands in the HTOX field of the HSDB database. The ADJ command retrieves only citations with the exact phrase "atrial arrhythmias" in the HTOX field. ADJ is the most specific command and retrieves the smallest citation set. The NEAR command retrieves all citations with atrial and arrhythmia within 10 words of each other in the same sentence in the HTOX field. The SAME command retrieves citations where "atrial" and "arrhythmia" both occur in the same HTOX data occurrence, although not necessarily in the same sentence.

Classes Offered

- The Fundamentals of MEDLARS Searching is designed for new searchers, focusing on ELHILL commands, MEDLINE, and the MeSH vocabulary. Fundamentals concentrates on NLM's command language searching and is not recommended for Grateful Med searchers or searchers using other MEDLINE vendors. There is no charge for this class. All students must hold an active MEDLARS User ID code.
- The Chemical/Toxicology/TOXNET Specialized Module covers the ChemID, CHEMLINE, TOXLINE, TOXLIT, and various TOXNET databases and assumes knowledge of the ELHILL command language. There is no charge for this class.
 All students must hold an active MEDIARS User ID code.
- The MEDLARS Refresher & Review (MEDLARS R & R), a four-hour workshop, will continue being offered by the National Online Training Center. The workshop includes a brief review of NLM system capabilities, a section covering recent enhancements to the system such as proximity searching, Pharmacologic Action Pre-explosions, key MeSH

vocabulary enhancements, and demonstrations of commands and techniques, such as SPRINT, online sorting features and Multi-File Searching (MFS).

The workshop is intended for the experienced ELHILL command language searcher who would like a system refresher or update on MEDLARS. Computer handson sessions are not included.

The MEDLARS R&R classes are offered on a cost recovery basis; the fee is \$45.00 and 4.0 MLA Continuing Education credit hours are awarded for completion of this class.

Unlike previous years when the MEDLARS Refresher & Review was conducted by the three Regional Online Training Centers, this workshop will be offered by the National Online Training Center and conducted by one of the Center's trainers. The National Online Training Center will try to accommodate requests from Library consortia, groups and MLA chapters, but due to the extensive Fundamentals of MEDLARS Searching class schedule there is the possibility that some requests will not be met.

This schedule is subject to change and additional workshops may be added; call the National Online Training Center to verify the current schedule or to schedule an R&R in your area. The number is 1-800-338-7657 and press "2" at the prompt.

How to Apply

To register for classes, use the Request for NLM Online Training form found in Appendix B. Registration for all classes should be sent to the National Online Training Center located in New York, NY at the New York Academy of Medicine. Search Hint: Searching ELHILL Files for Words Containing Diacritical Marks

Introduction

Searchers need to be aware that the presence of diacritical marks can result in incomplete retrieval with proximity search operators in ELHILL files (e.g., MEDLINE, CATLINE, etc.). A diacritical mark is a symbol added to a character to distinguish it from another of similar form, or to give it a particular pronunciation, e.g., the accent grave in French, the German umlaut, the Spanish cedilla. The diacritical marks themselves, although they are coded into ELHILL, have never been displayed online because of the character limitations on most keyboards; until 1994 they were all

represented online by a single symbol, a colon, appearing before the letter the diacritical mark modified. Only the printed *Index Medicus* shows the correct, graphical display of all the diacritics.

As of January 1994, the colons representing diacritical marks ceased being displayed online in ELHILL (see pages 12-13 of the November-December 1993 *Technical Bulletin* for more details). Therefore, cafe´-au-lait displays online now as cafe-au-lait, not as cafe-au-lait. There is no colon shown to represent the accent grave over the e in cafe. However, behind the scenes, the

accent is still there in ELHILL, only the online display of the colon to represent it has been disabled. The translation to the appropriate diacritical mark still occurs during the process of creating *Index Medicus*.

To display the colons that represent diacritical marks during an online search session, give the command **SSET TRANS NONE**. (Depending on your software and hardware, diacritical marks may display as other characters including degree marks, boxes, etc.) Note the difference in the title display after this command is given. See Figure 1.

The Problem

These "invisible" colons can result in incomplete retrieval for the unwary searcher using proximity operators. For example, notice the difference in retrieval from the two search statements below. The user wants to retrieve all articles containing the phrase cafe-au-lait; the MeSH heading CAFE-AU-LAIT SPOTS was introduced in 1996, so earlier citations will need to be retrieved in another way.

SS 1 /C? USER: (tw) cafe and lait

PROG: SS (1) PSTG (94)

SS 2 /C? USER: cafe near lait

PROG: SS (2) PSTG (20) The reason for this difference is Text Word (TW) and Title Field Text Word (TF) searching ignore the colon in the word cafe but the proximity operator (NEAR) does not. Proximity operators (NEAR, ADJ, CONTAINS) see the underlying diacritic represented by the colon and so all citations that are caf:e-au-lait are not retrieved, because caf:e does not match the stated request for cafe.

The Solution

If you suspect that the word you are searching for may contain a diacritical mark and you want to use a proximity command, then the simplest thing to do is to truncate the word before the letter that has the diacritical mark as shown below.

USER: caf: near lait

PROG: SS (1) PSTG (91) The Text Word search retrieves 94 citations and the proximity search with the truncated term retrieves 91. This is because Text Word searching also searches the MeSH Heading Fragments (MHF) field for the individual words in a MeSH heading. So, the Text Word search retrieves three citations that are indexed with CAFE-AU-LAIT SPOTS, but do not have these words (with or without diacritical marks) in the Title or Abstract fields.

If truncation is not possible, because it is the first letter of the word that has the diacritical mark or because the truncated form of the word creates a retrieval too large for proximity searching, then it would be better to use Text Word searching instead.

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
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
